The Area Agency on Aging is an organization working within a federal mandate to inform, advocate, and plan for community services on behalf of older adults. The Area Agency on Aging is part of the National Network set in place by the Older Americans Act of 1965.

It is the mission of the Western Piedmont Council of Governments Area Agency on Aging to be responsive to the changing needs of older people, persons with disabilities, and their families through a community based system of supports and services. To listen carefully, respect individual choice, promote independence and assist younger citizens in planning for their later years.

The Area Agency on Aging staff works with advisory committees in each county to study the needs of older adults and plan for services to meet those needs. The service goal is to enable older adults age 60 and better to live independently in their own homes. Eligibility is based on need for the service, not on income. There may be a waiting list for some services.

- The Family Caregiver Support Program connects caregivers with community resources for education, support, and respite.
- Health Promotion Programs provides education for healthier life outcomes.
- The "Resource Directory for Older Adults" is a guide book published by our agency that is available to older adults, caregivers and service providers.
- Project C.A.R.E. (Caregiver Alternatives to Running on Empty) provides support for caregivers of those with Alzheimer's or dementia.
